Fellowship Mission

- Prepare emerging leaders to work in and improve the health of rural and other underserved communities in NC
- Honor the legacy of Jim Bernstein, founder and long-time director of the NC Office of Rural Health



BERNSTEIN FELLOWS

Jim Bernstein's Beliefs

- Everyone has a right to health care.
- Health care should be delivered in a respectful, patient-centered manner.
- Health care systems should belong to the communities where people live and providers practice.
- Successful health care organizations are led by talented, dedicated, and well-trained leaders.



Fellowship Overview

- Two-year period
- Begins every October
- Leadership development
- Healthcare sector primary focus
- Learning to collaborate with state and local leaders
- Recognizing strengths and challenges of rural communities





Fellowship Components

- Educational sessions to enhance Fellows' leadership skills and understanding of rural health care and rural communities
- Completion of an individual project addressing an important health care issue at the state or community level
- Mentoring by a key health care leader
- Engagement with health leaders and institutions at local, state, and national level
- Two experiential learning retreats



Fellowship Project





Projects vary in focus, and have included:

- design, launch, and/or evaluation of pilot programs
- creation and implementation of assessment tools
- development and distribution of best practice toolkits

Projects may benefit:

- a Fellow's organization
- · a regional or statewide task force or initiative
- the community at-large

Fellows may also choose to work together on a group project.



Fellowship Project

- Work with a self-chosen mentor to facilitate
- Will respond to periodic requests for updates on progress
- Will provide a summary presentation/product at the Bernstein Event during final meeting



Fellowship History

 The first class of 2 Fellows began their Fellowship in 2006

 Classes totaling 4-5 Fellows began in 2011

 Since 2006, 49 Fellows have completed the program

 The current class of 7 Fellows will graduate this October





Fellowship Criteria

Fellows represent numerous professional backgrounds including by not limited to practitioners, nutritionists, pharmacists, a dministrators, social workers, etc.

The program does not require an advanced degree.

Applicants must:

- Work in an organization in or serves a rural and/or underserved community in North Carolina
- Demonstrate a commitment to community-driven health care
- Demonstrate a commitment to remaining in North Carolina
- Demonstrate leadership potential
- Be sensitive to cultural diversity among client populations
- Hold realistic expectations about working in rural or underserved communities and with vulnerable populations



Funding for Fellowship



- Fellow's employer provides salary support (via 10-12% of work week dedicated to Fellowship time)
- Foundation covers event and travel costs associated with required educational sessions
- Each Fellow receives a stipend to support development and implementation of Fellowship project



Application Requirements

- Curriculum vitae or resume
- Written statement of interest
- Letter of support from employer
- Letter of recommendation from a professional source
- Signed statement of understanding and commitment

- What are some areas of interest you wish to pursue in the development of your Fellowship project?
- What communities and agencies would be impacted by your project interests, and how can your project work bring positive and lasting change to these communities and agencies?
